A GLIMPSE INTO THE PAST

DeLaveaga Park is named for the park's generous benefactor, Jose Vicente DeLaveaga. Born in Mexico and schooled in Europe, DeLaveaga settled in San Francisco with his parents in 1868. A successful businessman, he acquired numerous landholdings. In 1892, his love of nature led him to purchase over 500 acres on the eastern edge of Santa Cruz, building a hacienda in what is now known as DeLaveaga Park.



DeLaveaga was also an avid horseman and bridal trails were established throughout the property. Trails led to La Corona, the highest peak, which offered dramatic views. Today, the overlook is known as Top of the World.

Exotic plants were imported by DeLaveaga to create a botanical garden. Vineyards, citrus and nut groves were also planted. The non-native eucalyptus groves along the southern portion of DeLaveaga Park are remnants of the imported plantings. Early photos of DeLaveaga Park from the southern bluffs reveal open grassland meadows with expansive views of Monterey Bav.

Nearly totally deaf, Jose DeLaveaga had special empathy for the poor and disabled. When he died in 1894, DeLaveaga left his estate to various charities. The estate in Santa Cruz was left to the City and County as a public park. Today, DeLaveaga Park is a cityowned parkland.

Over the past century, the property featured many different activities, including a military armory and tank practice areas, gun range, movie studios, and even a zoo, home to elk and black bears.

As you enjoy DeLaveaga's trails, look closely, and you may discover clues to the Park's unique history.


DELAVEAGA PARK TODAY

Today, a network of trails and a host of newer recreational activities are enjoyed by visitors. The upper park area features the DeLaveaga Golf Course and Clubhouse, the Disc Golf Course, and Archery Range. Within the lower park, there are ball fields, a bocce ball court, a volleyball court, playground and picnic areas.

DeLaveaga Park features redwood groves, oak woodlands, mixed forests and grasslands. In spring, you may see wildflowers within meadows and along forested trails. The natural areas also offer valuable habitat for wildlife, including deer, coyote, bobcat, and mountain lion.
