ACCEPTED: MEDICATIONS IN ANY DOSAGE FORM, EXCEPT FOR THOSE LISTED BELOW, IN THEIR ORIGINAL CONTAINER OR SEALED BAG.*

**If transferring medications to a sealed bag, please be sure to recycle all remaining packaging.*

NOT ACCEPTED: HERBAL REMEDIES, VITAMINS, SUPPLEMENTS, COSMETICS, OTHER PERSONAL CARE PRODUCTS, MEDICAL DEVICES, PET PESTICIDE PRODUCTS, BATTERIES, MERCURY-CONTAINING THERMOMETERS, SHARPS, AND ILLICIT DRUGS.

ACCEPTED FOR SHARPS DISPOSAL



ACCEPTED: SHARPS (SUCH AS HYPODERMIC NEEDLES, PEN NEEDLES, PRE-LOADED SHARPS, AUTO INJECTORS, INTRAVENOUS NEEDLES, LANCETS AND OTHER DEVICES USED TO PENETRATE THE SKIN FOR DRAWING BLOOD, OR FOR THE DELIVERY OF MEDICATIONS) CONTAINED IN U.S. FOOD AND DRUG ADMINISTRATION-CLEARED SHARPS CONTAINERS.

NOT ACCEPTED: CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES, UNWANTED MEDICINE NOT CONTAINED IN SHARPS, AND LOOSE SHARPS THAT ARE NOT CONTAINED IN U.S. FOOD AND DRUG ADMINISTRATION-CLEARED SHARPS CONTAINERS.

WHAT SHOULD YOU DO WITH YOUR UNWANTED MEDICINES AND SHARPS?

There are a number of ways to dispose of unwanted medicines and sharps.

Medicines help treat diseases, manage chronic conditions, and improve health and well-being for millions of Americans. It's vitally important that patients take their medicine as prescribed by their health care provider and as indicated on the label or packaging. Storing medications and used sharps securely to prevent accidental ingestion, sticks, or misuse (especially by children) is also very important.

If you have Unwanted Medicine or Sharps, proper disposal is easy. To protect your privacy, consumers are reminded to remove all personally identifiable information on prescription labels or materials of Unwanted Medicine before using any of the available disposal options.

UNWANTED MEDICINE DISPOSAL OPTIONS

1 CHECK THE PACKAGE

If there are specific instructions for disposal on the label, package or package insert, please follow those instructions. Do not flush drugs down the toilet unless specifically instructed to do so.

3 MAIL-BACK

4 UNWANTED MEDICINE IN-HOME DISPOSAL

1. Remove medication from its original container and mix with an undesirable substance, such as used coffee grounds, dirt, or kitty litter.

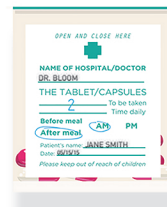


2. Place the mixture in a sealable bag, empty can, or other container and throw in your household trash.*

HOUSEHOLD SHARPS DISPOSAL

1 CHECK THE PACKAGE

If there are specific instructions for disposal on the label, package or package insert, please follow those instructions.



Never place sharps in the trash or recycling, and never flush them down the toilet. Disposing of sharps in the trash or recycling may put trash and sewage workers, janitors, housekeepers, household members, and children at risk of being harmed.*

2 CONVENIENT LOCATIONS

Dispose of used sharps disposal containers in convenient kiosks located in pharmacies throughout the city. Convenient kiosks may be available in your area, visit www.med-project.org for more information.



3 MAIL-BACK

Pharmacies in the city should be able to provide information about the availability of sharps mail-back packages. To order a mail-back package, visit www.med-project.org. Be sure to follow any instructions provided by the container manufacturer.



HOUSEHOLD SHARPS DISPOSAL

Sharps can be dangerous to people and pets if not disposed of safely. Sharps can cause injuries and/or spread infections that cause serious health conditions. These infections may include: **Hepatitis B (HBV), Hepatitis C (HCV), and Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV).**

Safe sharps disposal is important whether you are at home, at work, at school, traveling, or in other public places such as hotels, parks, and restaurants. Pet owners who use needles to give medicine to their pets should follow the same sharps disposal guidelines used for humans.*

SHARPS DISPOSAL CONTAINERS

Approved sharps containers must be: made of a heavy-duty plastic; able to close with a tight-fitting, puncture-resistant lid, without sharps being able to come out; upright and stable during use; leak-resistant; and properly labeled as "sharps waste" or with the biohazard symbol and the word "BIOHAZARD" to warn of hazardous materials inside the container.



Place all sharps in a sharps disposal container immediately after they have been used. This will reduce the risk of needle sticks, cuts, and punctures from sharps. Sharps disposal containers should be kept out of reach of children and pets.

DO NOT REUSE SHARPS DISPOSAL CONTAINERS.
