


# **Residential Street Trees and Landscape Strip**

#### Intent:


Pedestrian oriented design is the act of creating safe and attractive places and connections between places. Landscape strips provide an opportunity for pedestrian buffering and a decorative streetscape element. Landscape strips provide identity to an area, increase pedestrian safety and enhance the aesthetics of community livability.

# Standards to implement the intent:



### **Mandatory**

 A minimum 3 foot landscaping/ planting strip must be provided along streets between the curb and sidewalks where the property line is set back a minimum of 7 feet from the back of curb.



- 2. The minimum width of the sidewalk shall be 4 feet.
- Plant materials shall be a mixture of drought tolerant deciduous and evergreen trees. Drought tolerant plant materials may contribute up to 50% of the required landscaping and street trees. Selection of trees shall be from the approved street tree list and trees will be provided by the City Arborist.

- 4. City's recommended street trees shall be planted in every 10 linear feet or can be planted in groups in the planting strip.
- 5. All landscaping elements, plant materials and street trees shall be planted and maintained by the adjacent property owner
